Office of Elections Representatives to be at Tallwood on May 29

Representatives of the Office of Elections will be available to answer questions on how you can become an election officer in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Representatives will be at Tallwood at 10:00 on May 29.

The office is recruiting voters to serve as election officers a few days a year, including the upcoming general election on Tuesday, Nov. 3. Election officers are needed at each of the 240 precincts in Fairfax County to run the polls and assist the voters.

In order to be an election officer, you must:

· Be fluent in English

- · Be a registered voter in the Commonwealth of Virginia
- Be able to fulfill the federal I-9 employment eligibility requirements
- Attend a 3-hour training class

- · Have basic computer skills

Election officers are offered a stipend of \$175 for serving a full day. Bilingual citizens are encouraged to serve as language assistance is needed in many precincts. Residency in Fairfax County is not required. It is a wonderful opportunity for those interested in the election process or public service. Glenn Kamber opened the May 1 business meeting with a discussion of our upcoming 25th anniversary. This provides an opportunity to reflect on who we are and what we want people to know about us. In pondering this, Glenn concluded that a major aspect of our OLLI is being an engagement organization. We are not just about classes but provide social engagement to our members. Going forward it is important to bring our newer members into this OLLI-Mason community.

Jennifer Disano then reviewed our current status, the past year and our needs. Jennifer emphasized that we are a volunteer-run organization and participation is vital. She discussed the major accomplishments of the past year: the new

registration system, the much needed repairs at Tallwood generously funded by the university, opening of the new Loudoun location at Signal Hill, the increase in social activities at Reston and the enhanced partnership with the Reston Community Center. Fairfax County Urban Search and Rescue (Virginia Task Force 1) Visits OLLI

Did you know that Fairfax County is home to an internationally renowned search and rescue team? Virginia Task Force 1 is comprised of 210 highly trained and equipped firefighters, paramedics, physicians, structural engineers, and other specialized experts, plus a crew of six sniffer dogs. Last week, 57 members of this elite force flew to Nepal on short notice, where they immediately went to work in hopes of rescuing survivors of the recent

earthquake there.

Five days after the quake, the team hit pay dirt. Working with Los Angeles County rescue workers and Nepali police, they helped extricate a young man named Pemba Tanang from the rubble where he had been buried alive. He was

thirsty but otherwise unharmed, and wearing a New York Yankees t-shirt. He was the first live rescue that the Fairfax County team made in Nepal.

Meanwhile, here on the home front, Deputy Chief Charles Ryan of the Task Force addressed a full house at OLLI in Fairfax, on Wednesday, April 29. His presentation included photos just released from Nepal, as



well as a thorough explanation of how his amazing team functions. After his talk, he was peppered with challenging questions from OLLI audience members, and he earned a resounding round of applause.

It's not every day that we get to meet our local heroes, and the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute is honored to have had that opportunity. Kudos to Stephanie Trachtenberg, the OLLI member who arranged this special event.

A Day in the Life of Karen Nash: OLLI's "Institutional Knowledge"

Have you ever wondered who keeps OLLI's financial gears turning smoothly? That talented and experienced person is Karen Nash, who serves as the finance associate for all three OLLI campuses.

Karen pays OLLI's bills, handles the 16 employees' payroll, taxes and 403b contributions as well as the quarterly payroll tax reports and

annual W-2s. One of Karen's major responsibilities is to track who has paid dues and who hasn't, providing that membership information to the executive director, Jennifer Disano. She works with the Finance Committee and prepares necessary financial reports before each monthly Board meeting. If the yearly audit is approaching, she gathers all the necessary documentation and financial information for the previous year.



In a typical day, Karen responds to telephone calls and emails and performs her many and varied tasks. She reviews and pays bills. She coordinates bus arrangements for any upcoming trips as inputs to each term's catalog and calculates the cost per member of those trips. She continually updates financial spreadsheets and records. As a key member of a small staff, Karen finds that it's often hard getting everything done with so many demands, especially when class catalogs are going into production and yearly audits are due.

One of Karen's recent challenges was helping implement the new OLLI registration system. Her close work with the previous registration system helped her advocate for various kinds and levels of user support to help members learn and use the new system. She recognized that members have a range of computer experience and, therefore, a range of needs for assistance with the new system.

Karen likes the flexibility of her schedule. She works at OLLI three days a week (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) and spends Tuesdays and Thursdays working at a for-profit company. What she finds most interesting is the "opportunity to get a good overview" of what's going on within OLLI. A 10-year veteran of the OLLI staff, she "enjoys working with OLLI members" and getting to know more about their "interesting backgrounds." Karen says, "I really enjoy working for OLLI. It's a good place to work and it's fun."



Computer Club

The Computer Club (OLLI Personal Computer User Group, or OPCUG) will meet with its partner, the Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society (PATACS), on Saturday, May 16 at Tallwood. Join us at 12:30 for soft drinks and socializing in the social room. The program will begin at 1:00.

The first presentation will be by Dr. Patrick Gillevet from George Mason University who will speak on "The Selfish Microbiome." Most people are aware that their gut plays host to various communities of microbes that aid in digestion and other vital functions in a symbiotic relationship that benefits both people and bacteria. These microbial communities are beneficial and even necessary to their human hosts, but sometimes get out of balance resulting in illness in the host.

The human microbiome is an integral component of the *entire* human ecosystem and has far-reaching involvement in social behavior, reproduction, growth, cognition, and many diseases. Like the 'selfish gene', which uses individuals to propagate itself, the microbiome uses us to propagate itself, fortunately for the benefit of both organisms. Computers play an essential role in the computational analysis of non-linear systems in ecological modeling relevant to our subject.

Dr. Gillevet has been the lead scientist at the Environmental Biocomplexity and Ecology Group at George Mason University since 1996.

In the second presentation, Gabe Goldberg will talk about "Learn 30: Amazon Firestick." Gabe will look at a relatively new technology arrival, Amazon's Fire TV Stick. This is a simple and inexpensive device which plugs into a TV set and receives streaming content over WiFi from one's own Internet connection. It can play many "channels" (each of which includes broad/deep material) such as Netflix and Amazon Prime. Gabe is a technology writer, editor, and consultant who focuses on audiences from consumers to computer professionals.
