Caroline Cocciardi focuses on a facet of Renaissance artist Leonardo da Vinci's artwork that has been overlooked for centuries but visible to the naked eye, which are Leonardo's placement and use of inspired knots throughout his artwork as seen in such iconic works as the *Mona Lisa* and The *Last Supper*. The intertwining knot Leonardo invents tells the story of a hidden message unlocked by Cocciardi and revealed in the Mona Lisa's embroidery pattern
